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COURSE RECOGNITION

All Dominion courses are recognised by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA).

The University of Canterbury in Christchurch, certifies that Dominion students who achieve the following standards have satisfied the English language requirements for entry to undergraduate courses: Cambridge Certificate in Advanced English with a grade A; Cambridge Certificate of Proficiency in English with a grade C or higher.

2. EXAM COURSES (see page 10 for Examination Courses Timetable) CAMBRIDGE (PET, BEC Vantage, First Certificate, Advanced, Proficiency); IELTS; TOEFL; TOEIC.

ENTRY TO EXAM COURSES

Acceptance into all examination courses is at the discretion of the Director of Studies.

CAMBRIDGE EXAM COURSES: Dominion will send details of assessment tests. If student's level is found to be below the required entry level after student arrival in New Zealand, student will either take a General English Course or transfer to an Exam Course at a lower level (if available).

IELTS, TOEFL AND TOEIC COURSES: Students wishing to take these Exam Courses need to enrol for a General English Course that commences at least 2 weeks before the chosen Exam Course Registration date. When in New Zealand, the student will be assessed prior to entry to the chosen Exam Course. If student level is not satisfactory, the student can either continue with a General English Course or transfer to an Exam Course at a lower level (if available).

NOTES FOR CAMBRIDGE EXAM STUDENTS

Examinations are usually held in the week after the Exam Course has finished. Students need to ensure they book accommodation for this extra period. Teachers are available at no extra charge to assist students with revision and exam preparation during the examination week. Students may sit Cambridge exams at more than one level if they wish. (Conditions apply)

CAMBRIDGE BEC VANTAGE

A University of Cambridge Business Examination course for students with or without business experience. Course dates are in the EXAMINATION COURSES TIMETABLE. Course entry acceptance information is outlined in 2. EXAM COURSES

ENGLISH PLUS BUSINESS STUDIES

An introduction to the language of the business world, for students with Intermediate level of English and above.

Length of course:	4 weeks
Course starts:	Monday 21 January (Christchurch), Monday 23 June (Christchurch), Monday 4 February and Monday 21 July (Auckland).
Course content:	General English in the mornings. In the afternoons students are introduced to the language of the business world.
Topics covered include:	applying for a job; introduction to business correspondence; telephone English; speaking and listening in business; etc.
Fee includes:	25 hours of tuition a week and a Dominion Certificate of Achievement in Business Studies
Entry requirement:	Intermediate +

EXECUTIVE BUSINESS ENGLISH

Length of course:	2 weeks
Course starts:	Monday 25 August (Auckland only) - Maximum 6 students in a class.
Course content:	A wide variety of business-related topics are covered including: Social English for executives; effective communication in organisations; good customer service and handling difficult customers; making presentations; business correspondence; effective negotiating; formal and informal meetings; active listening; non-verbal communication; etc. At the beginning of the course, a needs assessment will be conducted to ensure that the course is tailor-made to students' requirements.
Fee includes:	20 hours tuition a week, a Dominion Certificate of Achievement in Executive Business English and 2 hours conversation with a practising English speaking professional.

Teenage School students can also be met on arrival and transferred to their accommodation in both Auckland and Christchurch and request to be transferred back to the airport at the end of their studies (transfer fees apply).

WORKING HOLIDAY VISA

Available for students aged 18-30 years, from 26 different countries Available for 12 months: Students from some countries can apply online - www.immigration.govt.nz Can study a maximum of 12 weeks Can work a maximum of 12 weeks in any one job

If a student wishes to use Dominion's services to find work, and the use of Dominion facilities, then the student must first study at the Dominion school in the city where work is wanted for a minimum of 100 contact hours

WORK AND STUDY VISA

Available to students of all nationalities, of all ages (18 years +) Minimum study 24 weeks (20 hours a week) Maximum 20 hours a week work while you study Must have IELTS 5.0 at time of application (no other tests are acceptable)

Students who obtain a Work and Study Visa to Study at Dominion, receive free as part of their Dominion course: a Two Week Intensive Bar Course, in the evenings, at the Auckland Professional Bar School. (www.barcourse.co.nz). This course provides a student with the skills to work in bars, cafes and restaurants: bar tending, cocktail mixing, coffee making, service in cafes and restaurants, use of cash registers, credit cards, eftpos, customer service, knowledge of wine and food, etc. Successful students are awarded a Bar, Cocktail and Restaurant Diploma. This Diploma and these skills help students obtain work, with the assistance of Dominion and The Professional Bar School.

Most work available is in the travel and hospitality industries. Seasonal work is available on farms and in orchards and vineyards

"Work Experience", where a student wishes to develop career skills, is difficult to arrange for short term employment, and nearly always requires an interview after the student arrives in New Zealand . Dominion provides assistance to find suitable "Work Experience", but can offer no guarantees. Payment for casual work is usually NZ\$10-NZ\$12 hour, taxed. For information on New Zealand tax laws visit www.ird.govt.nz

DOMINION PROVIDES: (1) FREE job placement service, after the student arrives in New Zealand (2) FREE on-going support and advice (tax rates, minimum wages, workers' rights, employment law) (3) FREE access to Dominion facilities (email, student lounge, etc) while in NZ (4) FREE monthly lecture on "Living, Travelling and Working in New Zealand" (at Dominion Auckland).

CONDITIONS: (1) Dominion does not guarantee work placement

(2) Dominion guarantees a minimum of three job interviews: these can be for work anywhere in New Zealand; student responsible for own travel expenses

(3) student must be prepared to work a minimum of 8 continuous weeks in any one job if required

(4) student should provide Dominion with a copy, in English, of past Work Experience in advance of arrival

(5) Dominion will provide assistance to prepare a CV for job applications (6) Dominion must be provided with a copy of the student's travel and medical insurance, from the time of leaving home, until the time of arriving back home.

ACCOMMODATION OPTIONS

TRAVEL TIMES BETWEEN ACCOMMODATION AND DOMINION: All accommodation options, except homestay and self-catering motel, are within 10 minutes walking distance of Dominion schools. In Auckland homestays are 30-45 minutes on average by public bus or ferry. In Christchurch homestays are about 20-30 minutes by public bus from the school.



APPENDIX 1: SUMMARY CODE OF PRACTICE FOR THE PASTORAL CARE OF INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Introduction

When students from other countries come to study in New Zealand, it is important that those students are well informed, safe, and properly cared for.

New Zealand educational providers have an important responsibility for international students' welfare.

This pamphlet provides an overview of the "Code of Practice for the Pastoral Care of International Students" (the Code), and provides a procedure that students can follow if they have concerns about their treatment by a New Zealand educational provider or agent of a provider.

What is the Code?

The Code is a document that provides a framework for service delivery by educational providers and their agents to international students. The Code sets out the minimum standards of advice and care that are expected of educational providers with respect to international students. The Code applies to pastoral care and provision of information only, and

not to academic standards.

Who does the Code apply to?

The Code applies to all education providers in New Zealand with international students enrolled. The Code is mandatory to these providers and must be signed by them.

What is an "international student"?

An "international student" is a foreign student studying in New Zealand. **How can I get a copy of the Code**?

You can request a copy of the Code from your New Zealand education provider. The Code is also available online from www.minedu.govt.nz/goto/international

How do I know if an education provider has signed the Code?

The New Zealand Ministry of Education maintains a register of all signatories to the Code. This is available online from www.minedu.govt.nz/goto/international. If the education

provider that you are seeking to enrol with is not a signatory to the Code, you will not be granted a permit from the New Zealand Immigration Service and you will not be able to study at that institution.

What do I do if something goes wrong?

If you have concerns about your treatment by your education provider or by an agent of the provider, the first thing you must do is contact the principal, the international student director, or another person who has been identified to you as someone that you can approach about complaints at your institution. The Code requires all institutions to have fair and equitable internal grievance procedures for students and you need to go through these internal processes before you can take the complaint any further.

If your concerns are not resolved by the internal grievance procedures, you can contact the International Education Appeal Authority (IEAA).

What is the International Education Appeal Authority (IEAA)?

The IEAA is an independent body established to deal with complaints from international students about pastoral care aspects of advice and services received from their education provider or the provider's agents. The IEAA enforces the standards in the Code of Practice.

What will the IEAA do?

The purpose of the IEAA is to adjudicate on complaints from international students. The IEAA will investigate complaints and determine if there has been a breach of the Code. The IEAA has the power to impose sanctions on education providers who have committed a breach of the Code that is not a serious breach. These sanctions include an order for restitution, publication of the breach, and / or requiring that remedial action be undertaken.

The IEAA will refer complaints that are not about pastoral care to another regulatory body if appropriate.

The education provider will be given a reasonable time to remedy the breach. If the breach is not remedied within that time, the IEAA may refer the complaint to the Review Panel. The IEAA can determine if it considers that a breach of the Code is a serious breach. If the breach is a serious breach, the IEAA will refer the complaint to the Review Panel.

What can the Review Panel do?

The Review Panel can remove or suspend an education provider as a signatory to the Code, meaning that the provider would be prevented from taking any more international students. Only the IEAA can refer complaints to the Review Panel.

A summary of the Code of Practice for the Pastoral Care of International Students

The Code sets standards for education providers to ensure that:

- high professional standards are maintained
- the recruitment of international students is undertaken in an ethical and
- responsible manner
- information supplied to international students is comprehensive, accurate, and $\ensuremath{\mathsf{up}}\xspace$ to date
- students are provided with information prior to entering into any commitments
 contractual dealings with international students are conducted in an ethical and
- responsible manner
- the particular needs of international students are recognised
- international students are in safe accommodation
- all providers have fair and equitable internal procedures for the resolution of international student grievances

Full details of what is covered can be found in the Code itself.

The Code also establishes the IEAA and the Review Panel to receive and adjudicate on student complaints.
